"Were You There" is an American spiritual that was first printed in 1899. "Were You There" was likely composed by enslaved African-Americans in the 19th century. It was first published in William Eleazar Barton's 1899 Old Plantation Hymns. In 1940, it was included in the Episcopal Church hymnal, making it the first spiritual to be included in any major American hymnal. As reported in Howard Thurman's autobiography, the song was one of Mahatma Gandhi's favorites. The song has been recorded by many artists. A critic from the Indianapolis News wrote about Paul Robeson's rendition of "Were You There", saying that "It was as startling and vivid a disclosure of reverent feeling of penetrating pathos as one could imagine."

Dear Church, what a blessing to enter the joyous season of Easter with no restrictions on gathering! We continue to maintain clean sanctuaries and Covid is still a lingering threat, but we have come so far from the start of the pandemic. We closed the doors in March 2020 and put all of our Holy Week services online only.

There was much lamenting at this first time in history when churches around the world closed their doors. It was devastating. We grappled with the reality that we would not be gathering for Easter Sunday, not at church and not with family near and far. But, for me, it was reassuring to hear people speak so sincerely about how upset they were, about how much the church really meant to them.

I look forward to hearing what you have to say, and I am so grateful to be church with all of you in-person, online and in community with the Holy Spirit. You are a blessing to me and to so many others! May God richly bless you this Holy Season and Always!

"God calls us to go into crisis areas to help those who are most vulnerable," said Franklin Graham, President of Samaritan's Purse. "As the conflict escalates in Ukraine, our international disaster

response teams with doctors, nurses, and other specialists are equipped and ready to help people in Jesus' Name. We want them to know that God loves them and has not forgotten them."

Samaritan's Purse continues to provide medical relief to displaced Ukrainians, serving them at their Emergency Field Hospital on the outskirts of Lviv, in western Ukraine. The hospital opened on March 14. They are also operating a 24-hour medical clinic at a train station in Lviv and have opened an additional clinic in one of the city's major bus stations. A



fourth medical intervention has been set up as an Emergency Outpatient Clinic in Southern Ukraine.

Their DC-8 cargo plane airlifted the initial phase for our medical response—an Emergency Field Hospital—on March 4, along with Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART) members—including doctors, nurses, and logistics and other personnel. After landing in Poland, the team and equipment were transported overland into the war-torn nation of Ukraine. An additional DC-8 flight on March 8 and a chartered 747 flight on March 10 brought more materials for the hospital. Airlifts aboard their DC-8 March 17 and 24 carried medical supplies destined for Ukrainian hospitals as well as relief supplies to assist families during their travails with food, warmth, and hygiene.

The CES Engineering group called a meeting with the Faith & Fellowship Center Project committee on February 10th to complete the final amount of information that needs to accompany the engineering drawings to be presented to the would-be general contractors for bids.



The committee responded to over fifty-some questions concerning such things as: electrical hookups, HVAC for the facility, type of flooring in various parts of the Center, the trim for the windows, interior door materials, the size of the sidewalk, and many more questions to help the contractors to estimate their final bids.

The final bid package should be ready for distribution at some point during the month of March. The bidding process will be overseen by the CES group, and the acceptance or not acceptance of the final bid will be the determined by the F&F Center Project committee.

UCC officers share prayer for Ukraine by UCC Leadership | published on Feb 24, 2022

"There are six things that the Lord hates, seven that are an abomination to him: haughty eyes, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, a heart that devises wicked plans, feet that make haste to run to evil, a false witness who breathes out lies, and one who sows discord among brothers." Proverbs 6:16-19



As the attention of the world turns to the ignored cries for peace from the people of Ukraine, we the officers of the United Church of Christ join our prayers with those of churches and people of faith all over the globe that the attack against Ukraine will cease. As a Just Peace Church, the United Church of Christ calls for the de-escalation of violence and a return to diplomatic negotiations, the only true way conflict ever ceases. We urge our members to pray throughout the day for peace and protection against the evils of war for the people whose lives and well-being are in danger, and to make this Sunday a day of collective prayer and fasting for a peace that only God can bring.

Holy God,

Hear our prayers for all those who will die today because of war in Ukraine and other war-torn countries all over this world. Grant them an end to the suffering of this world and eternal peace that is only found in You.

We pray for the people of Ukraine, Russia, and all nations — that war and bloodshed can be avoided and a new, just peace can be forged out of this crisis. We ask God grant wisdom to the leaders of nations, calling them to end provocation on all sides and invest instead in "the things that make for peace" as called for in all our faith traditions (Luke 19:41-2).

We pray for an end to the deep insecurity and mistrust on all sides, and call on leaders to build trust, based not on military might or alliances, but on the basis of our shared future and common humanity. Now is a time in which past harm should be acknowledged and addressed, and new partnerships can be envisioned.

We pray for and call on our leaders to have the courage to take small, verifiable, and independent steps toward peace, inviting others to reciprocate. Now is time to invest in conflict resolution, diplomacy and international cooperation — not more weapons which only escalate tension in the region.

Hold them close to your heart and stay the hand of the enemies against them. Give us the courage and the strength to cry aloud against wickedness in high places that dare to harm others made in your image.

Comfort the children and heed their cries to be saved from harm in this world.

Make us a people who love our children, all of our children, more than we love greed, power, and control. Overturn governments of tyranny wherever they are found. Disrupt the intentions of evil and give us power to stand against demonic forces of greed and control. Grant that peace and justice come to warring nations by the hands of those courageous enough to stand and study war no more. Let Thy kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven, we pray.

¹⁵ One of the dinner guests, on hearing this, said to him, "Blessed is anyone who will eat bread in the kingdom of God!" ¹⁶ Then Jesus^[a] said to him, "Someone gave a great dinner and invited many. ¹⁷ At the time for the dinner he sent his slave to say to those who had been invited, 'Come; for everything is ready now.' ¹⁸ But they all alike began to make excuses. The first said to him, 'I have bought a piece of land, and I must go out and see it; please accept my regrets.' ¹⁹ Another said, 'I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I am going to try them out; please accept my regrets.' ²⁰ Another said, 'I have just been married, and therefore I cannot come.' ²¹ So the slave returned and reported this to his master. Then the owner of the house became angry and said to his slave, 'Go out at once into the streets and lanes of the town and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind, and the lame.' ²² And the slave said, 'Sir, what you ordered has been done, and there is still room.' ²³ Then the master said to the slave, 'Go out into the roads and lanes, and compel people to come in, so that my house may be filled. ²⁴ For I tell you, ^[b] none of those who were invited will taste my dinner.'"
