

ST. PAUL'S CHRISTMAS SHOE BOX MINISTRY

There are millions of children in need around the world, many who have never received a gift. Since 2007, St. Paul's UCC has participated in Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child Shoebox program and have packed and donated a total of 646 boxes. Each child will hear and receive a copy of The Greatest Gift, a Gospel booklet about the gift of salvation being in Jesus Christ alone. The booklet includes 11 Scripture stories and invites them to follow Christ. Children take this Gospel message home to read with their family and friends. The Gospel booklet is produced in more than 90 languages and distributed in more than 100 countries around the world.

Empty shoe-boxes and information will be available at the church beginning Sunday, Oct.9. You may also use your own empty cardboard shoe-box or purchase a plastic shoe-box with lid. The back to school sales in the fall and end of summer sales of clothing and shoes are two great sources of purchasing shoe box items. Recently, a local thrift store, "Dave's Putting a New Leash on Life" has stocked new Target clothing items for children at a greatly reduced price. Adult clothing in size small would fit the 10-14 year old boxes.

The Children and Adult Sunday School classes are going to fill boxes on November 6th in lieu of lessons that day. You may start bringing in donations to fill the boxes any time. There will be a "collection area" for items in the upstairs Sunday School Room.

A list of suggested items to donate is included in this newsletter.

DEADLINE FOR RETURNING THE FILLED BOXES TO ST. PAUL'S IS SUNDAY, NOV. 20.

. A donation of \$10 is requested for each shoe box to help cover shipping and project costs. If you are not able to shop to fill a shoe-box, you can still participate by your donations that will be a great help to this special ministry. A gift to Operation Christmas Child helps cover processing and shipping expenses and allows teams to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with children and their families. Make checks payable to Samaritan's Purse with a note on the memo line "Operation Christmas Child", and give donation to Mary Haubrick.

FOR OLDER BOYS:

Tools—hammer, screwdriver, wrench or pliers, duct tape, measuring tape Small Fishing Kit, fishing line, hooks, Binoculars, Watch, Collapsible Water Bottle Small calculator, Handkerchief, Soccer ball (collapsed) and Ball Pump

FOR OLDER GIRLS:

Small sewing kit Clip on earrings Jewelry

Coin Purse Ink Pad and stamp set Colored Sharpies

A friendship bracelet with extra string so they can make more.

DO NOT INCLUDE: Used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figures; Candy or food; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snow globes or glass containers; aerosol cans.

DO NOT PACK ANY CANDY OR

TOOTHPASTE!

TOYS: include items that children will immediately embrace such as dolls, toy cars, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, balls, toys that light up and make noise (with extra batteries), etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES: pens, pencils and sharpeners, crayons, markers, notebooks, paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

NON-LIQUID HYGIENE ITEMS: toothbrushes, bar soap, combs, washcloths, etc.

ACCESSORIES: t-shirts, socks, hats, sunglasses, hair clips, jewelry, watches, flashlights (with extra batteries), etc.

A PERSONAL NOTE: You may enclose a note to the child and a photo of yourself or your family. If you include your name and address, the child may be able to write back.

Remove packaging from your items so that you allow for more room in your box and so that they don't have much trash to throw away.

St. Paul's United Church of Christ helped their beloved friend and church member, Elizabeth Kerlin celebrate her 99th birthday on Sunday Sept. 18, 2022, following the morning worship service.

The church record book of St. Paul's Reformed Church, list Elizabeth L. Morton's name on the "Cradle Roll" as a very young, little girl in the 1920's, and she was later confirmed at age 14 on April 17, 1938 by the late Rev. William J. Lowe; making her a church member of 84 years! Elizabeth has faithfully served The Lord and her church her entire life, and she continues to inspire her church family by her weekly attendance each Sunday at Sunday School and Worship Service. When asked "How are you, Elizabeth?"...her quick reply is always "I have no reason to complain".

The church family of St. Paul's U.C.C. extends much love and their prayers that God will con-


tinue to bless and strengthen Elizabeth each day.

St. Paul's Very Important People...

Elizabeth Kerlin

When I think of a worship service at St. Paul's, a dinner, a women's group meeting, or a community worship service, I think of Elizabeth Kerlin. She has



been a faithful occupant of one of our pews since she was born in 1923. Her parents were Edith and Earl Morton. Earl was one of ten Morton siblings, who have blessed Fulton County since the 1700's.

Elizabeth lived in the old toll house at the edge of Lincoln Way and the Peach Orchard Road. The stone wall and steps to that property still remain. She probably used those steps to walk into town to school. The Mortons belonged to the Reformed Church when a Federation existed with the Presbyterian Church. She remembers going to Sunday School with her good friends Betty Washabaugh, Lyle Duffey and Warren Daniels who were her classmates. On Sunday evenings they went to "Christian Endeavor" for Christian lessons taught by Rev. William Lowe.

Elizabeth became an official member of St. Paul's when she was twelve years old. Meta Lynch and Olive Hohman were her Sunday School teachers in the room where the church office is today. This special lovely room would one day become her room to teach the youngest children in the church congregation. She gives much credit to Dorothy Stevens her co-teacher. This all started in the 1950's, when their children were that age. Elizabeth nurtured many young ones till she retired to the Adult Sunday School Class.

After high school she went to the Business School in Harrisburg, and worked at Letterkenny. She married a school friend, Herman Mellott. They lived in Missouri while he was in the Army Air Corps. Then in Gettysburg and Bethleham while he attended college after his military service.

Herman's father owned a coal stripping operation in West Virginia where they lived for six months.

Tragically Herman was killed in an airplane accident in July 1948. Rev. Laquear who married them also officiated at the funeral.

Elizabeth returned to live with her parents who were now residing in town in the white house next to the present Kerlin home. And she returned to Letterkenny to work.

Thank goodness for the dedication service of the Fulton County Medical Center the next year. Her friend, Alma Naugle introduced her to a new young lawyer in town, who was also attending that event. A match was made with this Burnt Cabins young man, and in 1953 Rev. Brindle tied the knot, and St. Paul's had two dedicated lay people who would lead our church for many years.

Stanley was born in 1954 and Suzanne in 1958. Elizabeth was teaching when Loy and I came to St. Paul's, and our boys benefited from her special Sunday School room experiences, as well as many other children over the years.

Elizabeth recalls the fire at the church as frightening, and joined with others in the restoration process. She has fond memories of the class meetings held by the Church Women's Group. The ladies took turns meeting in each other's homes. Ruth Washabaugh's home was a favorite meeting place, because of her great refreshments. Other memorable church women were Nell and Rue Barmont Elsie Shimer and Phlene Mellott.

I admire the faithful dedication of Elizabeth to our church, and was not surprised to learn that her Christian love keeps on giving despite her years and occasional lapses of memory. She calls her church friend, Jean McLucas, in the evening; and Peg Gordon in the morning. They make sure each is alive and well.

Her four grand children have a quiet, unassuming grandmother very much worth emulating. I hope they realize this as we do at St. Paul's. Elizabeth's favorite charity is the American Cancer Society in Merrill's honor.

After the meeting with Mr. Rock, the committee discussed strategies, and are working on developing a timeline for completing the project.
