From the Great Omission to Vibrant Faith and Vibrant Faith in the Congregation

The greatest insight in "The Great Omission" is my amazement that there is actually a 6-5-4-3 "recipe" for vibrancy in congregations that makes real sense.

Working with Pastor Marleen and other church leaders I can see short excerpts from the books that could be easily shared at the beginning of consistory meetings to inspire that core group to modify the approach of members to better fulfill the church's mission. Even before COVID, Trinity was shrinking. Now they are seriously wondering how long the church can continue. It is a great time to push a reset button in our church to develop deeper relationships with those around us.

I took time out to find Trinity's "purpose"/mission statement: **The avowed purpose of this church** shall be to worship God, to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ, and to celebrate the Sacraments; to realize Christian fellowship and unity with this church and the Church Universal; to render loving service toward mankind; and to strive for righteousness, justice, and peace.

"Doing less but going deeper" is a huge benefit to a congregation where only 20 people are currently coming through the doors each week. It is an approach that is manageable with a small core group of disciples.

I am excited to learn that refocusing on our families and homes can make such a huge difference and that teens and young adults really want caring relationships with adults. I have worked with youth assets in the community and on teams with youth who want to be leaders. I have seen youth in caring Christian relationships with adults at our church. I am, however, surprised that the youth are receiving the introduction of cross+generational relationships in a more positive light than adults are in many locations. Great food for thought!

Milestone Ministry is a totally new concept to me. It has frequently saddened us when some members of the church only enter the doors for Christmas, Easter, baptisms, weddings, and funerals. Milestone is an amazingly positive approach of using those teachable moments. I am delighted to find a faith formation approach for connecting with families, homes, and individuals that you only see once or twice a year.

This is something that I believe the members of our church can do. We can reconnect and connect anew without casting such a broad net that we overwhelm ourselves. While I have experienced some of these concepts, I have not seen them applied to Christianity for a long time. Starting small has huge benefits.






